Rising to the challenge, Camp Quality Canada staff and volunteers launched a remarkable Camp At Home program combining traditional camp fun with leading audiovisual technology to bring joy and laughter to many campers in our community.

What the campers and volunteers missed in an away-from-home experience, they made up for with their creativity, enthusiasm, friendship and resilience.

Together we learned one very important lesson: while cabins and campfires are important, the secret ingredient in CQC camps is the alchemy of our campers and volunteers.

Behind the scenes, the Camp Quality Canada support team reduced office space and pivoted to a virtual work environment where newer and seasoned staff worked creatively together. Continued leadership focus on deficit reduction and overall financial stability served the organization well in 2020. So, then when it came to be online, I think they were still super excited because they got this big box of amazing goodies and all the activities that were planned every day were just awesome from all of the volunteers." Andrea says, adding "and for me, watching them with these new experiences, it was so much fun. I love taking pictures of them and sharing with the camp group what they were doing. They had a ball."

Though virtual camp wasn't quite the respite some of our parents get from in-person camp, we've heard from many parents that it was a welcome change of pace, to have structure and activities in an otherwise often-chaotic time in the world.

These activities complemented a 5-day virtual camp program held over Zoom. Campers joined in the morning and evening for fun camp activities and a chance to connect with other campers and volunteers. Activities were intentionally designed to be fun, engaging, meaningful and challenging.
